Tistory records that in 1822 a British Colonial cutter named "HMS Snapper" Captained by William Edwardson sailed through the "Pt Danger Shoals" as mapped by Captain Cook 52 years earlier, taking a west by northwest course to follow the shoreline of a huge bay Ithe Gold Coast]. The northerly tip of the volcanic rock outcrop of 'Pt Danger" around which cap'n Edwardson turned about is now known as SNAPPER ROCKS in tribute to that good ship. Captain Edwardson and his crew did not put to shore in this area as they had left their balsa malibu's back in South America. They were not happy because legend has it that on this day in 1822 the waves were cranking from behind the rock at Snapper Point and winding through to Cooly Beach.




Beginnings

At the time of publication the club is able to boast ten individual World Champions and numerous National Teams Titles including two surf League Titles, five Kirra Teams Challenge Titles and thirteen consecutive Straddie Teams Challenge Titles Iin the total of fifteen wins. I club members range from micro-grommets to grandparents and they embody a spirit that any club would dream of.

# The Early Years...


In the early years the club saw members come and go. The beaches of Coolie swarmed with sandies, side merchants and greasy haired rockers. About 100 surfers, mainly young men laid a really solid foundation and the club saw the first of the chicks join. Those black and orange board shorts were seen in the water at local club competitions. The Dolphin Contest, the Currumbin Surf-capades and the Paradise Carnival held at Surfers Paradise. These contest were often like surf club carnivals with paddle races and fun events like egg throwing contest.

One of the most impressive club members of this era was Jeff "Bully" Arnold who was often seen surfing Greenmount Point ripping up a five-foot swell on his 9'4" long board. About the same time Phyllis O'Donnell, also a Snapper Club member was being crowned the first World Womens Champion, it was 1964 [Go the Girls]. Other outstanding surfers in these early years were John "Snake" Sims, Wayne "Sav" Johnson, Terry Vardy, Jimmy "Jingles" Johnson, Wayne and Robye Deane, Robbie Pearce, Bill Flemming, Peter, Greg and Neil Turner, Jim "Thumb" Boyd and Terry Baker.

In attempt to find a home for Snapper Surfriders in the late sixties, an opportunity arose for the club to build a clubhouse at Duranbah Beach. Local businessman Sid Aspinal, a sponsor of local competition, instigated a New South Wales Government Grant. This facilitated a change in name and locale for Snapper Rocks Surfriders as they crossed the border. Tweed Heads Surfriders Club [formally known as Snapper] was the first in Australia to obtain a club house. Whilst this seemed like a good idea at the time, selling raffle tickets and raising money was far removed from the original idea of surfing for fun and many members drifted away and Graeme Merrin resigned as club president.

The clubhouse at Duranbah still stands as testament to the efforts of these earliest members.

Pennants won in numerous paddle races SRSC still hung in the clubhouse in the '70's.

### ELEVEN YEAR PRESIDENCY BY TERRY BAKER

Founding member of SRSC Terry "Weeny" Baker, together with Bob Suiter, Geoff Darby, Bill and Peter Grant, Peter Bryant, Alan Miscamble and a few other's reformed the club at its original meeting place, in 1973.

SRSC appointed nationally famous surfer Peter Townend as its secretary. P.T. nominated his grommet cousin Geoff Milne who bought along his two mates Bruce Lee and Robbie Dorrough.

Others to follow soon after included Richard Dall, Micheal and Peter Jones, Todd Lee, Sean and Pat Riley and John Buttenshaw.

"Weeny" as few fondly referred to, was rock solid as the club's leader for eleven years, and had also established himself as one of the worlds first professional surfing judges


"Weeny" installed in SRSC's young members the importance of accurate and quality judging even during the smallest of club contests.

1973 to 1984 was a solid formative period for SRSC and champions such as Wayne Deane, Peter Bryant, Michelle Ducat, Glen "Rocky" Rawlings, Todd Lee, Sean Riley, James "Chappy" Jennings, Jason Buttenshaw, Donna Couch, Craig "Scat" Pitchers were all nurtured by "Weeny's" fuition.

Here Terry remembers some of the earlier club activity.

"My recollection of the crub are many and quite often amusing, particularly in relation to the numerous weekend trips to compete with other clubs. The club had around 100 members and the mid 60's was a period of intense competition, both within the club and with other clubs along the coast.

If you were in the team your parents might let you go on the trips away, so every trip was an "important competition" and you would tell your parents you'd be letting the club down if you didn't go. Cars were always in short supply, much more so than now, and it was a case of load all the planks on top and pile in."




## ELEVEN YEAR PRESIDENCY

To alleviate the lack of transport I went half share in an old Ford Consul with Bruce Glazebrook. The police would not let us drive it in Queensland so we had to park it near the R.S.L. club in Tweed Heads if we wanted to surf Greenmount & Snapper. The suspension was so worn that the car shook uncontrollably over 40 M.P.H. It wasn't long before the car was laid to rest in Bruce's back yard and the motor was put in a boat.

The driver of the decade award went to Jim 'Thumb' Boyd with his high speed slalom course through the pine trees at Greenmount car park and the resulting police chase through five or six Snapper members in Jim's Kombi but unlike Jim they didn't spend the night in Coolangatta jail. The policeman involved was John 'Dicko' Dickinson, the "Terror of the Tweed".

There was also a rather extraordinary surfing trip in 1971, Joe Larkin, the Kirra board builder, took myself, Michael Peterson. Peter Townend, and Wayne 'Rabbit' Bartholomew to Bells. There was an intense rivalry between P.T. and M.P. and I'm sure Rabbit probably gave it a push now and again. We were camped at Merrimbula on the N.S.W. south coast and P.T. had turned Michael's board over and let all the wax melt off. The surf was good so Michael was furious and rubbed butter over the deck of P.T's board to get even. Rabbit and myself went surfing while they argued. P.T. was the first to succeed in major contest with a third place in the World Titles at San Diego in 1972,



### The Evergreen-Wayne Deane Presidency 1984-1987


In 1984 Wayne Deane [W.D] took over the ropes as President of Snapper [S.R.S.C]. His presidency continued until 1987. Often referred to as "the Waterman". W.D. commenced surfing as a grommie with his brother Robye at Greenmount in the 1960's. Both brothers followed in their father's footsteps. Their passion for quality surf continues and both Wayne and Robye can often be seen surfing as the sun rises over Snapper Rocks. He remembers.

When you're a kid you never really think too much about the future, well I know I didn't anyway. Surfing and more surfing fills your mind and before you realise it your hooked!

Our father, John Deane, started Robye and myself surfing and I am grateful that he is an adventurous sort of bloke who loves the beach and surfing.


Dad was involved in founding the Australian Surfriders Association of Queensland (A.S.A.Q.), first as Secretary and later becoming President for a couple of years.

In the early stages of the A.S.A.Q. a few clubs were formed along the Gold Coast and there were two at the southern end, namely Kirra and Snapper Rocks. I remember seeing surfers wearing the same board shorts and

wondering why. Finding out that they were members of a club, Robye and I asked dad if we could talk to some club members about us joining their club. He spoke to George Herbert at the next A.S.A.Q. meeting and George nominated us into Snapper (its a good thing for Snapper that John Deane didn't see Mal



night or Kirra Club would have got the Deane brothers). Fronting up at the first meeting was a bit hard but after it was over our confidence increased and we pedalled home stoked. We paid the 10 shillings (\$1) entry fee and we were entitled to wear those black and orange shorts.



The club has had many such personal successes over the years from within the ranks to International level.

The world famous trio of Peter Townend. Michael Peterson and Wayne 'Rabbit' Bartholomew emerged in the early 70's. The rivalry between

Rabbit, P.T. and M.P. was intense with each trying to out-do the other and they went on to become three of the greatest surfers ever.

Peter was World Champion in 1976 and two years later Wayne took the title from Shaun Thompson. Michael Peterson was a member of the S.R.S.C. when he was a cadet and later joined Kirra Club. Michael was always a loner and few people understood

him but his surfing (especially at the big groyne at Kirra) was pure genius.


For one club to have those exceptional surfers was remarkable and certainly inspiring for the younger members. Looking back over the years it is interesting to see just who is still turning up to

meetings and contests. A lot of members drop out but I guess that's understandable with work and family commitments. When the club was reformed in it's original format their was a whole new generation of kids. Raw recruits thrown in with veterans from the previous campaigns. Some of the new faces that joined were Bruce and Todd Lee, Dick 'Good Looking Member' Dall, Geoff Milne, Peter Jones, Sean Riley, Paul 'Hoppy' Hopkins, Jason Buttenshaw and quite a few more.

The juniors have always been very strong and through 1977-1981 it wasn't unusual to see half the positions in the Gold Coast Team filled by Snapper members. Being selected in the team has always been an honour for me because just making the team in a club full of hot surfers is an achievement in itself.


The older guys pass on their experiences and hopefully the grommets will

and prize money world-wide. He

The last 14 years as President of Snapper, have been filled with unforgettable memories, as several generations of the 'black and orange' have stepped onto the cauldron, proudly wearing the Snapper colours.

When I took on the Presidency, Bruce Lee was General Manager, he still is, and basically running the day to day affairs of the club. Peter 'Mont' Bryant had served as Vice President, again, he still is,

and 'Mont' and his new wife Lorraine


became a great team, providing the backbone to Snapper's revolutionary Junior Development Program.

Snapper has always been a successful club, as the records show. By '87, the club had had it's fair share of Gold Coast and Queensland Team Sheilds, and numerous professional events.

I think it's fair to say that my major aim as presidency was in the area of competitive success. Bruce and I have taken many teams away since 1982, he as manager myself as coach, and while success did come our way I felt we were underachieving especially in Sydney.

I distinctly remember campaigns that left a sour taste in my mouth. We attended several Villa combinations, only to come away with a disappointing 3rd or 4th. I was home from the World Tour for the 1986 Straddie Assault, only to see North End comfortably beat off our challenge on the title they'd won in '85.

That did not sit well with me at that point, part of the club was into partying and mucking up, while Bruce and I were into Snapper being the premier club. Mont and I had the WRB Academy of Surfing, and we applied that formula to the club, incorporating a Junior Development Program. This was ahead of it's time and fortunately we had kids such as Trevor Gleave, Jason Buttenshaw, Shane and Dean Bevan, Craig Pitchers, Will Lewis and Jay Phillips to work with.





### THE 'RABBIT' FILES

#### 1987 - CURRENT PRESIDENT

Snapper enjoyed a great level of success in the Quiksilver Surf League. State Champions many, level surfers involved in the Straddie Streak. Space many times. The club was perennially in the top 5 or 6 in the nation, and a huge focus by our Junior Development Program was to produce a team combination capable of winning the league.

We figured that if the club could develop these hotties into an elite level, and they certainly showed this potential, then we could complement our front line attack of Chappy Jennings, Key 'Snail' Charman, Alby Ross, Greg Faulks, Bugs, Rob Cohen, Sean 'Reg' Riley and with the kids, creating a championship foundation.



We pretty much had a policy of accepting all comers in cadet, iunior and female divisions with an open door policy, we figured water would find it's own

level. The truly dedicated members would weather the Snapper ranks.

At various times kids from rival or distant clubs would have a stint with Snapper, only to return, with our blessing and support, to their own club a more seasoned competitor.

Young guys may come to Coolangatta from interstate, spend three or four years at Snapper, reach club representational level, then return home to lead and nurture their own club. Sean Munro, Josh and Christian Lock are fine examples of this. Darren Rocks. Magee spent some great years with Snapper, then returned home to lead Noosa into battle against us. That sort of evolution is part of club folklore.

The plan came into effect, I missed the '87-'88 Straddie Assault through ASP Pro Tour duties, but I clearly remember the excitement when Bruce turned the '89 team over to me. "Go for the hat trick Bugs!" yelled Bruce, as we convoyed out of town. History states we got that hat trick, and 10 more after that. Those early Straddie victories were really important because they set the club on a course to greatness.

The backbone to our success was the dedication of Peter and Lorraine Bryant. Bruce and I may collect the silverware, but month in and month out, Mont and Lorraine are there on the hill at 7am Sunday mornings to rally the troops for club rounds, squad interclub clashes, club championship and wrapping it up at the end of the day with our traditional barbie. Our barbies are a time for a brief meeting which is the time of our initiation ceremony of any new members.


There have now been four generations of top doesn't allow me to list all club reps, but from Wayne Deane and Mont, to Alby and Rob Cohen, to Chappy and Snail, Butto and Scat, Bevo and Will, Trev and Baldy Rawlings, Joel Parko and Deano Morrison, Clint Kimmons, Josh Kerr and this years possible debutantes Jai Boyce, Luke Dorrington, Sean and Dean Harrington, Jarrah Tutton and Dane McIntosh, the club has trotted out championship calibre outfits.

The unearthing of a future talent is a Straddie Assault tradition within Snapper. I can remember a micro "Butto", a pint sized Trev Gleave and a miniature Dean Morro' strapping on the oversized contest singlet and being asked to contribute to the team effort with a win. The loudest applause is set aside for the giant killing performances by the supergrom of the year.

The victory tunnel is always deferred to one performer a guy who puts his heart and soul into every performance in club colours. Jay Phillips is the perfect anchor man. The amount of times I have given Jay his final heat instructions, watched him the rugged competitive totem pole, and settle into march through the club "rank and file" on his way to battle, then proceed to smash the opposition to seal another Straddie Assault or Surf League or the Kirra Teams Challenge Victory, is simply beyond comprehension.

The cool thing is that Jay, Will, Bevo, Joel, Dean, Trev or whoever the hero is always comes back to share it with the club. We love snatching a title, going back to our lair and having a few quiet ones around the barbie at our beloved Snapper

Snapper has a small committee, basically unchanged in 15 years. An executive decision was made to limit entry into the club. This may sound elitist but we figured that if this committee all agreed on the clubs direction, and we did. "why even risk having other agendas come from the floor, in other words" if it ain't broke don't fix it!"






### club Achievements








### SNAPPER CLUB CHAMPIONS




# Girl Power!
